

Parks & Maintenance

PARK MAINTENANCE STAFF

The Public Works Parks and Facilities Maintenance Division includes 16 full-time and 17 seasonal staff. This staff is responsible for maintaining the grounds of all City-owned parks and facilities.

MAINTENANCE ACTIVITY

Plants and Shrubs

Weed control, pruning, and landscape bed cleanup.

Building and Structure Maintenance

Blowing and pressure washing shelters, sidewalks, parking lots, basketball courts, tennis courts, pickleball courts, and skate park.

Irrigation Maintenance

Installs, repairs, and maintains the automatic turf irrigation systems.

Tree Maintenance

Pruning, tree inspections, tree planting, stump removals, leaf pickup, and

watering.

Grounds and Trail Maintenance

Weed removal, invasive removal, and trail clearaning.


Turf Maintenance

PARKS MAINTENANCE

- Coordinated the installation of an 80' pole and platform for Osprey to nest at Wanschers Park..
- Reduced the compaction of Rainier Vista's volleyball courts by 120%.
- Repaired bulkhead supporting the bridge at Woodland Creek Park
- Generated 1,142 park related work orders
- Improved pickle ball court at Lakepointe by re-painting lines and installing a fence around the court.
- Removed graffiti from 93 events.
- Removed 510 yds of leaves from Parks

- Moved irrigation and relandscaped beds at Civic Plaza to accommodate the new Gold Star memorial.
- Tree work:
 - Planted 136 1 gallon trees in Parks
 - Planted 450 bare root plugs
 - Planted 187 2"C street trees
 - Removed 141 hazard trees
 - Pruned 401 City owned trees








COST OF PARKS, CULTURE & RECREATION



Greg Cuoio Park & Greenways

After the master plan completion, work got underway for Phase 1A Design and Community Engagement. Phase 1A is slated to open in summer of 2024 and will include park entry, parking, a large picnic shelter, 18 holes of disc golf and many trails for the public to enjoy. The public chose a "nature" theme for Phase 1 of the playground. The board is very excited to finally open this park to the public! Some board members toured the site, and a few went back for a second time to learn about the wildlife at the site.

COVID-19 Adjustments

The Parks Board is relieved that restrictions lifted this past year and more programs could get up and running. The City rolled out a new hybrid format for all public meetings and all Parks Board meetings were held in the new hybrid format in 2022.

Grants and Donations

2022 was a very successful year for grants and donations. The Parks Board:

Received \$5,000 from the Parks, Arts, Recreation & Cultural Foundation of Thurston County for youth scholarships Received donation of two rugby permanent goals (valued at \$5,000) at the Regional Athletic Complex field #4 from **Deschutes Rugby Club**

Acknowledged receipt of \$39,715 from North Thurston Public Schools / OSPI funding for Playground Pals program Acknowledged receipt of \$68,100 from SEEK (Safe Environment for Every Kid) / OSPI funding for Summer Day Camp program (AWC facilitated, WRPA distributed)

Received and acknowledged a 20 acre donation adjacent to Mullen Road Habitat which doubled the size of this open space park site.

Long Lake Park Expansion

The Parks Board acknowledged the City purchase of 1.8 acres of property adjacent to Long Lake Park, which has been a long term goal and vision for Lacey Parks, and received that acreage into the Lacey Parks system.

Parks, Culture & Recreation Comprehensive Plan Update

The Parks Board kicked off the six year comprehensive plan update by conducting five months of community outreach (Energize Lacey!) in order to confirm public priorities heard the year prior from the Lacey Caresengagement. The Parks Board looks forward to finishing this large project in 2023.

II2022 was a memorable year for Lacey Parks! The Greg Cuoio Park & Greenways Master Plan (GCPGMP) was finished early in the year after 14 months of visioning, concept planning, and working with the community, consultant, multiple City departments, and the Parks, Culture & Recreation Board. The GCPGMP is a long-term vision for the 537 acres of park and natural space that makes up the northwest corner of Lacey, and a significant segment of Lacey's parks system. City Council then prioritized and approved moving forward with Phase 1A which will provide safe entry to the new park, parking, a large picnic shelter, playground, a multi-use trail network and 18 holes of disc golf. Phase 1A is intended to open to the public by the summer of 2024.

In addition, the second phase of community outreach was completed in preparation for the Parks, Culture & Recreation Comprehensive Plan update, 20 acres of natural space adjacent to the City-owned Mullen Road Habitat was donated to the City by a developer which doubled the size of the habitat, and City Council prioritized and approved the purchase of the private property adjacent to Long Lake Park adding 1.8 acres to the park and fulfilling a long term goal for the future vision of the park. Public Works began work on the design of the Regional Athletic Complex (RAC) Parking Lot Conversion and adjacent street frontage improvements, and received a CMAQ Grant to install Electric Vehicle Charging Stations at several City facilities, one of which is the Lacey Community Center located at Woodland Creek Park.

Public Works Parks Maintenance staff are continually maintaining our parks to keep them in pristine condition. A few of the parks improvements of 2022 include the following: RAC staff installed two permanent 40' rugby goals to Field 4. The goals were donated by the semi-pro Deschutes Rugby Club that now calls the RAC home. Compaction testing at Rainier Vista's volleyball courts revealed the sand courts were compacted. The courts were tilled and re-tested which showed a form compaction reduction. Fencing was installed around the Lakepointe Park pickleball court and staff repainted lines and installed a new net to complete the court refurbishment. We want to express sincere appreciation to our staff for their care of our beautiful parks spaces every day, and for going above and beyond with these special projects!

Parks and open spaces continue to provide free access and improvement of overall physical and mental health and well-being of our residents. It's important to point out why Lacey parks and programs are critical. The caliber of Lacey's parks system puts us among the best in the state. Lacey Parks:

- Play a vital role in the social, economic, physical, and emotional well-being of residents Encourage active lifestyles and reduce health costs
- Strengthen local economies and create job opportunities
- Make cities more resilient (stormwater/flood management)
- Increase community engagement and reduce crime Help clean the air (urban forests) and improve public health
- Provide a tool for cities to achieve equity goals

Lacey's park system, and the many programs and services available is made possible by a tremendous amount of teamwork between the Parks, Culture and Recreation Department, and Public Works' Parks Maintenance, Water Resources, and Project Management teams. In addition, the partnerships the City of Lacey has with North Thurston Public Schools, Senior Services for South Sound, Saint Martin's University, Lacey South Sound Chamber, and many more, enable the delivery of better, more efficient services. We are grateful for these partnerships which enable us to achieve more for Lacey together.
