PARK MAINTENANCE STAFF

The Public Works Parks and Facilities Maintenance Division includes 16 fulltime and 17 seasonal staff. This staff is responsible for maintaining the grounds of all City-owned parks and facilities.

MAINTENANCE ACTIVITY

Plants and Shrubs

Weed control, pruning, and landscape bed cleanup. **Building and Structure Maintenance**

Blowing and pressure washing shelters, sidewalks, parking lots, basketball courts, tennis courts, pickleball courts, and skate park.

Irrigation Maintenance

Installs, repairs, and maintains the automatic turf irrigation systems.

Tree Maintenance

Pruning, tree inspections, tree planting, stump removals, leaf pickup, and watering.

Grounds and Trail Maintenance

Weed removal, invasive removal, and trail clearing.

Turf Maintenance

Mowing, edging, line trimming, aeration, and fertilizing

Vandalism and Graffiti Removal

Repair or mitigation of vandalism and removal of all graffiti

Pressure Washing

Routine cleaning of assets to prolong life and ensure sanitary conditions

Sports Field Maintenance

Mowing, fertilizing, aeration, topdressing and renovation of sport field turf. Dragging infields, lining fields, moving bases, fences, pitching mounds, goals, and equipment necessary for user groups...



PARKS MAINTENANCE

- Coordinated the installation of an 80' pole and platform for Osprey to nest at Wanschers Park..
- Reduced the compaction of Rainier Vista's volleyball courts by 120%. Repaired bulkhead
- supporting the bridge at Woodland Creek Park
- Generated 1,142 park related work orders
- Improved pickle ball court at Lakepointe by repainting lines and installing a fence around the court.
- Removed graffiti from 93 events.
- Removed 510 yds of leaves from Parks
- Designed new park rules signs.










COST OF PARKS, CULTURE & RECREATION

In addition to the accomplishments that have been highlighted in this annual report, we would like to note some of the other Park Board and Parks, Culture and Recreation happenings from 2023.

Greg Cuoio Park & Greenways

Significant work continued toward the 90% design of Greg Cuoio Park Phase 1A. Construction of the park is expected to begin in early 2025. Two significant grants were awarded for the project totaling almost 1 million dollars from the Washington State Recreation and Conservation Office and the Washington State Department of Commerce.

Lacey Parks, Culture and Recreation Comprehensive Plan Update

A significant accomplishment was completing the 6-year update to the Lacey Parks, Culture and Recreation Comprehensive Plan. This is a guiding document for the future of the department and incorporates significant community input. The top takeaways from the public input were a pool, indoor recreation/playground, spray parks, and preservation of open spaces, additional trails, and natural areas.

Community Partnerships

Many community partners value the mission of Lacey Parks, Culture and Recreation and have committed or donated toward park projects. Gateway Rotary committed \$110,000 toward the playground replacement at William A. Bush Park, Thurston County Pickleball Association committed \$25,000 toward the construction of new courts at Rainier Vista Park, and the PARC Foundation of Thurston County donated \$6,000 toward the Financial Assistance Program

Lacey Parks, Culture and Recreation Enhancement Program

The community is enthusiastic to donate and add amenities to our parks. The Parks Board approved and launched the Enhancements Program to provide a streamlined and equitable way to consider additions and ensure contributions are well documented, celebrated, and shared with the Parks Board and City Council. In 2023, a free little library was built at Wonderwood Park, and two large stadium bleachers were donated.

Parks Rules Sign Update

The park rules signs were updated using icons and a more visually appealing design that is easy to read.

Another great year in the books for Lacey Parks! 90% design for the new Greg Cuoio Park Phase 1A is nearly completed with just under \$1M in grant funding from the Washington State Recreation & Conservation Office WWRP – Local Parks, and the Washington State Department of Commerce. The new park is intended to open to the public by late summer of 2025.

The 2023-2029 Lacey Parks, Culture & Recreation Comprehensive Plan was approved by the Parks Board and City Council. For the plan's development, input was gathered from the public, city staff, the Parks Board, Historical Commission, Commission on Equity, Youth Council, the Planning Commission, and City Council. This is the guiding document for Lacey's parks system and includes the Parks Capital Improvement Plan giving a snapshot of needed parks projects.

In addition, several programs and policies were created and updated. The Enhancements Program and Policy was created to establish guidelines and an equitable review process for all donations, known as enhancements, proposed to improve or enhance the City of Lacey's Parks, Culture and Recreation Department, its programs, facilities, and/or parks. The Parks Volunteer Program was expanded with centralization efforts, a volunteer recognition event, and an updated handbook. The Sponsorship Policy was updated to include a review process that will ensure alignment with the department's mission, vision and goals. The Financial Assistance Policy (formerly called Scholarship Policy) was updated to better communicate its purpose and make it more accessible for community members. purpose and make it more accessible for community members.

Public Works Parks Maintenance Staff are continually maintaining Lacey Parks to keep them in pristine condition. We want to express our sincere appreciation to city staff for their care of the public's beautiful parks spaces and for going above and beyond with special projects! Staff conducted or managed several park improvements in 2023:

- Rainier Vista Park: Replaced the fencing around the skate park, removed a section of fence at the pickleball courts to allow easier access, installed donated bleachers, and installed sleeves and temporary fencing to baseball fields to better accommodate fastpitch tournaments
- Regional Athletic Complex: Converted parking lot lights to LED, re-surfaced three basketball courts, made several significant repairs to the large play structure, replaced worn patches on 5 synthetic fields, re-lamped 240 athletic field lights and installed donated bleachers

- Long Lake Park: Replaced approximately 75 failed buoys in the swim area
 Civic Plaza: Re-landscaped for the Gold Star Memorial installation and dedication
 Huntamer Park: Expanded the holiday light display to include an animated display sequenced to music
 Converted irrigation controllers & clocks in the parks to utilize upgraded versions with cellular communication
- Planted 553 seedlings in parks

The caliber of Lacey's parks system is among the best in the state. Lacey parks and programs are critical for the community. Free access to parks and open spaces improves overall physical and mental health and the well-being of residents by:

- Encouraging active lifestyles and reducing health costs Growing job opportunities and local economies Building infrastructure resiliency (stormwater/flood management) Increasing community engagement and reducing crime Helping clean the air thus improving public health

- Providing a tool for cities to achieve equity goals

Lacey's park system, its many programs, and services are made possible by a tremendous amount of teamwork between the Parks, Culture and Recreation Department, Public Works' Parks Maintenance, Facilities Maintenance, Water Resources, and Project Management. Further, the partnerships the City has with North Thurston Public Schools, Senior Services for South Sound, Saint Martin's University, Lacey South Sound Chamber, and many more enable the delivery of better, more efficient services.
